SOME INTERESTING STATISTICS...



The Fall class, the One Day Adventure, added 107 new brethren to our roster. Here are some things I found: the youngest new member is **Bro. Joel Zelenske, 32°** from the Somerset area. He was born on 12/24/1996. The oldest "new" brother is **Bro. Art Wilt, 32°** born on 11/14/1926. I told him when I handed him his new Scottish Bible that he had to have it read before he died! If we break the class up by age groups, it looks like this (pretty accurate): Age 50 and older – 34; aged 40-49 – 26; aged 30-39 – 21; and aged 20-29 – 26. That certainly has a generation of two in there!

Most all of the class was gainfully employed... only 11 reported that they were retired...we had at least 12 brethren involved in the penal system as correction officers, guards, drug and alcohol tester, constable, several state troopers. Fortunately not one of these guys was on the other side of the street, if you know what I mean!! A couple of contractors (three, I believe), 8 independent business owners, 3 military personnel (all Marines, I think). We had more than a couple of "Equipment Operators" (mostly PennDot) and we had two Farmers. I can't remember the last time I knew a real Farmer, by trade! Great to have them...they promised to bring milk or butter or eggs or something to a meeting...or maybe some wheat or hay or soybeans... There are three college students and unfortunately, one of our newest brethren is currently unemployed. Surely someone can lend a hand to this guy!!!

How about where they came from...all over, to be sure. Most, but not all towns I have heard of and know generally where they are. The greatest number of candidates (16) came from Altoona and 10 from



Johnstown. But listen to this: 7 from Lewistown (they could have gone to Harrisburg!), 6 from Duncansville, 5 from Hollidaysburg and 5 from Somerset. Recommended changes to the By-Laws of the Valley of Altoona:

- 1) Article IX, Section 4 "All check, draft, or other orders for payment of moneys out of the funds of these Bodies shall be signed by the follow ing officers of the Altoona Lodge of Perfection: the Thrice Potent Master, the Treasurer, and the Secretary...." This shall be amended to read: "All check, draft, or other orders for payment of moneys out of the funds of these Bodies shall be signed by the following officers: The Treasurer and the Secretary..." This eliminates the Thrice Potent Master but still maintains the need for two signatures.
- 2) Article IV Section II to be added. It shall read: "The Secretary shall make available to the membership a list of all Candidates for Degrees in writing prior to the beginning of each reunion."
